

St Cuthbert's final resting place is in Durham Cathedral.

He is the North of England's best-loved saint. Cuthbert was loved in his lifetime and venerated after his death because of his love and gentleness, which showed itself in a kinship with the natural world and a concern for ordinary people. At a time when their whole world was collapsing around them, 8th century Christians kept their hopes alive, lit by the faith and example of Cuthbert.



Durham Cathedral - Accessibility

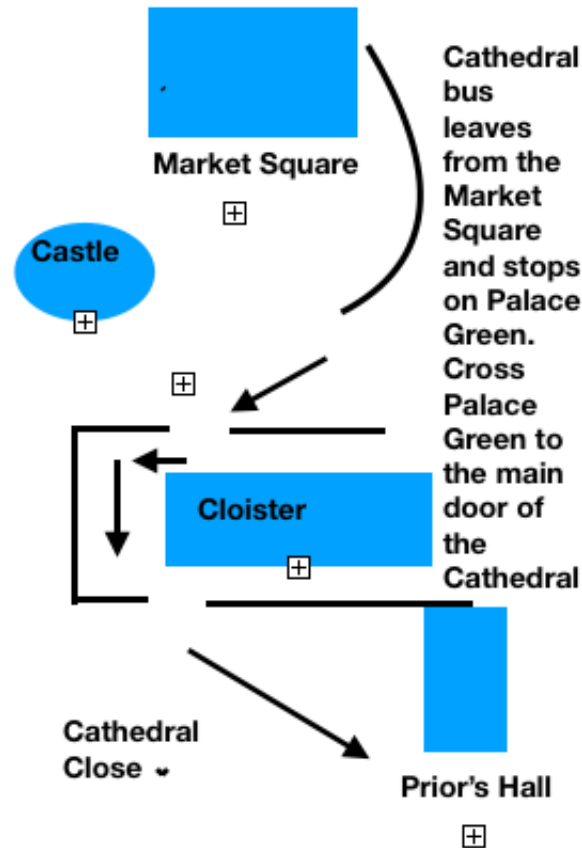
The **cathedral** floor is stone and uneven in places. **Wheelchairs** are available for the use of visitors on request and can be collected upon arrival. Please ask at the welcome desk if you require assistance. **Disabled Parking.** The **forecourt** can be used by blue badge holders.

There is very limited on street parking in Durham city centre

Arriving by car: Leave the A1 for the A690 into Durham. Immediately after the second roundabout, take the slip road to the Prince Bishops Car Park. Failing that, at the next roundabout after the river bridge, turn left, and left again into the Odeon Luxe Car Park 2 and the small Riverwalk Car Park 1.

The cost of 5 hours parking is roughly £5 to £6. It is marginally cheaper the further from the centre you are.

Or come into Durham City on the A690. Leave your car at the large car park at the **Railway Station** and take the **Cathedral Bus** from there up to the Cathedral. Senior Citizens' bus passes can be used on this service. The Cathedral Bus times at the Market Square are 10:13, 10:37, 10:48, 10:57 on a Saturday.
