Are you involved in ministry in your parish or Partnership? Maybe you're a Minister of the Eucharist, a Baptism Catechist, Children's Liturgy Leader or Bidding Prayer Writer, or one of the many other people who keep the Church and its mission moving forward; or maybe you would like to be but don't feel you have the skills. In any case, the Certificate in Pastoral Ministry may be just what you need.

It's offered by Loyola University Chicago, in conjunction with the Diocese, and is an academic qualification that's been custom designed to develop the practical skills you already have and give you the confidence to use them fully. It's also specifically tailored for busy people, so that it fits in with your precious spare time.

It will inform and inspire your practice, make you more effective, bring about better results and boost your confidence.

It is a two-year non-degree certificate delivered online, but with the chance to meet tutors and fellow students face-to-face for support. A key feature is that it allows you to get to know the people you are studying with and build up a network that can support your future ministry.

Modules and Delivery:

Year 1 Modules:

1. WHAT IS PASTORAL MINISTRY?

Students will explore what being called to pastoral ministry in the Church means today.

2. GOD WHO REVEALS: LOOKING AT THE OLD TESTAMENT

Students will be introduced to the whole range of Old Testament texts revealing a God who loves God's People.

3. CHRIST AND HIS DISCIPLES: LOOKING AT THE NEW TESTAMENT

Students will explore the New Testament texts with particular attention to the ministry of Jesus and of his followers.

4. MISSIONARY DISCIPLES: THE STORY OF THE CHURCH IN BRITAIN

Students will explore the historical background to the current situation of the Christian churches in Britain.

5. VISION OF THE CHURCH: VATICAN II

This course covers the story and promise of the Council, including a study of selected texts, discussions over its interpretation and implementation, and a dynamic view of its on-going relevance for the Church's self-identity.

Year 2 Modules:

6. HOLINESS AND WHOLENESS: HOW WE GROW AS PEOPLE OF FAITH

Students will explore human, spiritual and psychological development and the unique call each person receives to be fully human and alive.

7. MAKING CONNECTIONS: CATECHESIS AS SHARING FAITH TODAY

This course will deepen students' understanding of catechesis and its importance for the life and mission of the Church particularly the priority of adult formation. It will explore 'critical conversation' as an essential process for growth and development, and the relationship between evangelisation, catechesis and religious education.

8. BUILDING PARISH COMMUNITIES

Parishes are where many Catholics experience their faith in community. Contemporary and emerging models for building parish communities will be explored in detail. Students will also learn about best practices for healthy parishes and effective collaboration and team work.

9. BUILDING A FAIRER WORLD: CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING

Students will become familiar with the development of Catholic Social Thought and Practice in relation to particular contemporary global and local issues. Particular attention will be given to history, texts, methodology and significant figures.

10. SERVING AND LEADING: SKILLS AND STRATEGIES FOR MINISTRY

Students will explore the skills and strategies of effective pastoral ministry.

Method of Delivery:

Each module is taught over six weeks and will require approximately three hours of time. Weeks begin each Saturday and will follow a consistent pattern. At the beginning of each week, you will log in to the dedicated website and read the introduction, together with the description of the reading assignment. If there is a video lecture for that week, a link will be provided so that you can watch the video in your web browser. You will need to complete the reading assignment by Monday and post your response to the assignment by Tuesday. This is 250 words long and will be read by the other students in your online study group (usually 6 to 8 people). On Wednesday and Thursday, you should write at least two responsive posts to the original post of two colleagues in your group; they will also be writing responses to your original post. Friday is an opportunity to rest and soak in the learning from that week or to do some of the further study suggested.

There is usually a break of two weeks between each module, with an extended break at Christmas, Easter and summer. Any required texts will be provided online or by the Diocese.
