Lenz with Caster

ne of the phrases in Pope Francis' Exhortation, *Evangelii Gaudium* that has resonated with quite a few people is very timely as we prepare for the Season ahead: 'There are Christians whose lives seem like Lent without Easter.' (paragraph 6)

Lent is a valuable part of the year. We can all benefit from a time to tighten up our spiritual lives—a spiritual spring-clean for those of us in the northern hemisphere. But there has been a tendency to see it as a gloomy time of penance and doing without. Fifty years ago, the Vatican document, Sacrosanctum Concilium reminded us that 'The season of Lent has a twofold character: primarily by recalling or preparing for baptism and by penance, it disposes the faithful, who more diligently hear the word of God and devote themselves to prayer, to celebrate the paschal mystery. This twofold character is to be brought into greater prominence both in the liturgy and by liturgical catechesis. (paragraph 109) Basically, we are reminded that Lent is an important time to recall (or, for some, prepare for) our baptism. This is when we are brought from the darkness of sin into the glorious light of eternal life. It is a great joy and privilege. In the early Church, Lent was the time for final preparations for baptism and is known today as the Period of Purification and Enlightenment for those preparing for baptism at Easter. It was a time that mixed penance with great anticipation: I am willing to fast—to pray—to be more generous because I am preparing for one of the most wonderful moments in my life.

Many of us do not quite have that sense of anticipation—we have lived through Lents and Easters and focused more on the "giving up" and "doing without" than on the joy of resurrection. We become—like Pope Francis suggests—Lent Christians rather than Lent-but-looking-forward-to Easter Christians

As we embark on Lent, reflect on how you can bring the joy of the gospels to your daily life. Yes, we can fast—and pray—and be more generous in giving to the poor—but let us think about how they can be done in a way that manifests the joy that we are doing them because we look beyond the darkness to the brightness of Easter.

wo years ago, Kathryn was fortunate enough to go to Los Angeles for one of their annual Religious Education Congresses—with around 25,000 other Catholics! One of the talks she attended was "Spirituality for a Busy Person" by someone called Fr Jim Clarke who turned out to be Director of Spiritual Formation at St Johns' Seminary in the Archdiocese. She was so impressed that at the end she went and asked if he would consider coming over to Hexham and Newcastle! Fr Jim agreed and a visit is planned for May this year.

During his time in our diocese, he will lead a retreat day for our clergy and a day of reflection open to all **17 May on Holy Island.** He is leading a weekend retreat on 'Remembering the past, healing the present' at Minsteracres, 9-11 May. He will also be keynote speaker at two days organised by Bishops' Conference Spirituality Committee—**7 May** in London and **15 May** in Salford. These days are linked to the publication of a new document from Bishops' Conference on spirituality so would be well worth attending.

n 15 February, the Spirituality Network met in Newcastle. This was a chance for people interested in prayer and spirituality to meet up and to collect Lent packs for their deanery or group. We looked at some of the things already happening and at upcoming events in the diocese and beyond. One area that was of particular concern was that many people seem to find prayer difficult and do not seem to know the many ways open to them. The group decided to reflect on this and come together next time and spend time thinking about how they might provide resources and ways to help. Another area of interest was the idea of preparing resources for times of significant lossparticularly bereavement but also other major life events. A small group has agreed to meet and to think about what might be useful in supporting people through difficult times. The following weekend saw another Holy Island session—this time looking at Pope Francis' Exhortation on the Joy of the Gospel. We had a time to reflect on the gospel of the Sunday using the Pope's suggestions to help us to go more deeply into the Word of God. In the afternoon, we reflected on how we might share the love of God with others. How could we share those moments when Jesus touched our own hearts—and how might we be more aware of the sacred grandeur of our neighbour? The next day, 29 March, on the Island is a Lent Day that will be especially suitable for people preparing to be received into the Church but will be good for anyone wanting time out to focus on their spiritual life. Please note—the day is "across the tide" - 11am-5pm but there will be plenty of time set aside to enjoy being on the Island when it is an island! Just a reminder that in May we will be
