Spiricus Lescival of Spiricualicy


n Saturday September 6th, Durham Cathedral welcomed hundreds of people to an inspirational day of prayer and spirituality entitled "Spiritus". The day provided opportunities to explore and experience some of the many different expressions of spirituality within the Christian tradition. A variety of workshops was on offer including; 'Discipleship and Journeying in a Digital Age', 'Lectio Divina – Praying with Scripture', 'Icon Painting for Beginners', 'Gregorian Chant', 'Imaginative Contemplation', and many more. Those with a good head for heights were able to join the Rt. Revd. Paul Butler, Bishop of Durham, as he led prayers from the top of the Cathedral tower.

Within the cathedral were several stalls informing and promoting the work of many local groups including Minsteracres. A prayer walk and a display of icons of the Northern saints produced by a group of local iconographers proved very popular with visitors to the Cathedral.

The event was attended by many from our own diocese with some having travelled from as Bedlington. Members of the Diocesan African choir enlivened the liturgies with their music. Bishop Séamus was in attendance for the day and led a prayer session as well as delivering the address in the Closing Liturgy in which he outlined the importance of allowing words of Scripture and prayer to move from our heads to our hearts and so into our actions.

The cathedral was full for the Opening and Closing Liturgies, the power and beauty of which encouraged visitors to pause and participate. A range of music led by Alison Adams allowed for powerful expression of the work of the Holy Spirit. During the Closing Liturgy, Revd. Joanne Thorns was commissioned as Regional Officer for North East Churches Acting Together.

The success of the event has left the participants wanting more. Watch this space! \varPsi

Re-Connecting—an Idea prom Premier

Sylvia Walters, who is the Regional Director of Premier and based in Newcastle, sent us information about an idea for reaching out to local people who are isolated from the church. She writes: Premier is a national charity that works ecumenically with Christian Churches, people and organisations throughout the United Kingdom to support and resource them to promote Christian outreach and inclusion.

Our aim is to enable people to put their faith at the heart of daily life and bring Christ to communities. We use a combination of our multi-media platforms, and church connections to work together in new ways to reach out to some of the most isolated members of our community and make positive change happen to improve their daily quality of life.

We have developed an innovative project called Re-Connect that aims through a collaboration involving churches, Premier broadcasts and Lifeline, our confidential listening and prayer line, to reach out to Re-Connect 600 housebound people living

in the North East with 100 church communities.

We would like you to consider taking part in this wonderful initiative.

Do you know any housebound people who...

- regard themselves as Christian;
- are housebound as a result of physical and or mental disabilities; and
- have Spiritual needs that are not currently being met?

If the answer is yes, then the Premier Re-Connect Project has a set of tools to help your church to make a real difference to the lives of housebound people in your community. So how does it work? We supply your church community with DAB digital radios, copies of our daily devotional Voice of Hope and information about how to access Premier Lifeline. DAB radios are then offered to 6 people in each parish as individual gifts during a church pastoral visit.

We know that this lovely combination of church contact, Premier's Radio broadcasts 24 hours a day 7 days a week on DAB radio and Freeview 725, access to Premier's Lifeline, our confidential listening and prayer line, and the daily devotional Re-Connects people with the Gospel message in their own homes day and night.

The really encouraging part of the project is that the people who take part tell church pastoral teams and Premier just how much difference this project makes. Pastoral teams tell us it is a real joy to hear at first hand the individual differences it is making to the lives of people across the North East by forming new fellowships with members of their church community and by having their faith journey restored.

Anyone who wishes to be involved needs to get in touch today as radio numbers are now limited and the first stage of the Re-Connect pilot will conclude at the end of September.
