

Share in the Joy of the Annunciation



The angel of the Lord declared unto Mary and she conceived by the Holy Spirit.

Behold the handmaid of the Lord: be it done unto me according to your word.

And the Word was made flesh and dwelt amongst us.

On Sunday 29 March, England will be rededicated to Mary. This dedication has its origins back in 1381 when Richard II made England Mary's dowry. This 'dowry' is not a bride-price such as exists in some countries today but meant that England was 'set aside' as a gift for Our Lady, under her guidance and protection.

Several churches in the Diocese are planning events associated with the rededication—details will be available nearer the date.

Alongside the communal celebrations, there is the invitation to reflect on the Angelus—the prayer that is traditionally prayed at intervals during the day: 6am, 12 noon or 6pm. Many people will remember the Angelus bell which rang out to prompt people to pray. The Angelus has a very simple structure and is deeply scripturally-based. It reminds us of the turning-point in human history—the moment when the Creator of all that exists became human.

The suggestion from the Bishops of England is that we reflect on Mary's invitation and response—but also make it our own. The Latin word for 'let it be done' or 'be it done' is *fiat*. It is not as passive as it might sound—but is actually giving permission for something to be done or to happen.

Although we are not called to be part of such world-changing events, God does invites each of us to work with him on something that will make the world a better place. That is the invitation—but, like Mary, we have a choice. As we pray the Angelus, we can ask her for guidance and support as we work out what it is that God would have us do and, like Mary, trust that God will give us the wherewithal to carry it out. 


Lent Resources—Last Chance for 2020!




